Honoring Resilience: Learning from the Holocaust and the Dakota Exile

An intensive, inquiry-based seminar for educators focused on human rights lessons from the past to forge a new path into the future

St. Cloud State U., St. Cloud, MN

From Sunday evening through Saturday morning, participants will explore the roots of antisemitism and anti-Indian sentiment by engaging with primary source materials, listening to personal testimonies, and visiting relevant sites. Day trips include a visit to Mt. Zion Temple (St. Paul) and significant Dakota sites (Minneapolis).

Teachers will experience best practices through inquiry and writingbased pedagogies for teaching about the Holocaust and other genocides. The seminar examines past and present social justice issues, with a focus on resilience and hope for the future. Participants will receive resources and create a brief action plan for implementing Holocaust and genocide education in their classrooms.
