



Studying, Learning & Teaching: Critical Lessons in Holocaust Education

The Michigan Summer Seminar on Holocaust Education will ask teachers to assume the dual role of student and teacher of the Holocaust, and to balance the need for historical knowledge and context as teachers, with the needs of students and curricular outcomes in a modern-day classroom. During this week-long seminar, participants will deepen their own content knowledge of the Holocaust, while also working to create and explore teaching strategies that can help deliver the difficult material and lessons of Holocaust education with long-lasting impact on students.

The program will include testimony from Holocaust survivors and lectures by content specialists, on a comprehensive range of topics — from Nazi propaganda to working with primary documents, the pedagogy of genocide, antisemitism, and social justice, plus the role of media and creative writing in presenting historical fact, context, and relevance.
