Summer Seminar for Educators in All Disciplines

Educators will assume the roles of student and teacher as they deepen their knowledge of the Holocaust and Jewish culture and refine their teaching practice. Participants will:

- Use a multi-disciplinary, social-justice focused inquiry process to explore past and recent genocides.
- Hear from a variety of speakers including Holocaust survivors, writers, educators, scholars, and a rabbi.
- Visit local resources including National Yiddish Book Center; the Institute for Holocaust, Genocide, and Memory Studies; the Jewish Community of Amherst.
- Develop standards-based curriculum materials and strategies for teaching about the Holocaust and other genocides.

Cara Crandall, Ed.D., an ELA teacher in Longmeadow, MA, is a 25-year educator who has taught about the Holocaust and social justice throughout her career, including leadership in the Holocaust Educators Network.



Audrey Golden, J.D., Ph.D., is an Assistant Professor of English at Simmons University in Boston, MA. She is a scholar of postcolonial literature and international human rights law.
