The Wisconsin satellite seminar is designed for teachers who seek to deepen their content knowledge and explore best practices in Holocaust education. Participants hear testimony from two survivors and presentations on Jewish history and contemporary Jewish life.

The seminar includes a visit to the Illinois Holocaust Memorial Museum and Education Center in Skokie. Illinois and the Milwaukee Jewish Museum.

This grant-funded seminar is offered free of charge. Most meals are provided, and participants will receive selected materials. Participants coming from more than 40 miles away are eligible for a housing stipend on a first come, first served basis.
