Highlights of the Loudoun TOLI seminar will include:

- Presentations from scholars regarding the Holocaust and local African American History.
- Visits to the USHMM, the Belmont Cemetery for the Enslaved, the Orion Anderson Memorial, and other sites that illuminate the injustices of our local history.
- Visit to a local synagogue, exploration of Jewish culture and traditions, and testimony from a Holocaust survivor.
- Consideration of best pedagogical practices utilizing inquiry-based learning, reflective writing, and project-based learning to examine social justice and human rights in the classroom.
