

Inaugural Holocaust Educators Network Seminar at the University of Oregon

July 17th – 21st, 2017

LESSONS FROM THE PAST: UNDERSTANDING THE HOLOCAUST AND OTHER GENOCIDES

This intensive professional development seminar, offered by TOLI in partnership with the Oregon Writing Project at the University of Oregon, will provide educators with the opportunity to expand their awareness and understanding of the Holocaust and other, more recent genocides. Teachers will collaborate to develop classroom strategies to help their students understand how the past affects the present, find their voices in speaking out for social justice, and envision the wide-reaching impact of their future choices. Participants will also explore ways to integrate instruction on racial and ethnic discrimination in Oregon, specifically within the context of the Japanese-American internment during World War Two. The seminar also offers an orientation on general Jewish history.
